Instead of ending his 104-race losing streak, this driver ran out of fuel with the finish line in sight, half a mile ahead! Frustration and embarrassment would be understatements. But, he can go on to another race and try again.

What about a pastor running out of fuel? No, we are not talking about the juice that is needed to move the car forward, but the stamina to run the race, so that he can join the Apostle Paul saying: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith" (2. Timothy 4).

Unlike the NASCAR driver who will compete in the next race, the pastor who did not make it to the finish line most likely will never try again. You and I are created by God, equipped with unique gifts and talents to fulfill His purpose. And so are the pastors who have been called to shepherd His flock. What if they get so discouraged and leave their calling, never to try again? What if they run out of fuel? No next race to try again?

It is obvious:

We need to keep -- pastors from burning out.
We need to keep -- ministries like Shepherd's Refuge sustainable.

What can you do to keep -- your pastor from burning out?

- offer to volunteer for some of the tasks the pastor is overloaded with
- treat the pastors with respect so that their children are not turned away from the church
- encourage your pastor to spend quality time with the spouse and children
- pray for your pastor and the family
- bring your tithe into the storehouse, so that there is enough to compensate your pastor fairly

What can you do to keep -- Shepherd's Refuge ministering to pastors?

- join volunteer groups to help with some of the work on the property
- pray for the ministry as well as its guests
- consider making a one time donation to increase the available space so that we can meet the current demand and plan for future expansion
- become a monthly partner so that we can continue to provide scholarships to pastors who could otherwise not afford to come to Shepherd's Refuge
